



# Celebrating Denefield Friday 27 May 2022

# Wordwall



# MFL feature - the year abroad

It is usual for students studying languages at university level to spend part of their course in another country or countries. Usually students spend one academic year abroad but it is sometimes possible for them to spend longer. In order to give you a better idea of what that experience can be like, we asked the MFL colleagues to tell us a bit how they spent their time abroad. This is what they said:

# **Mrs Bodsworth**

I have been lucky enough to spend two years abroad in two very different German speaking countries.

As part of my degree course at Swansea University, I spent my third year in **Klagenfurt** in **Austria**. I spent the year working as an English Language Assistant in an Austrian grammar school, helping teenagers to speak English. It was a really rewarding job and I was lucky enough to live with a local family, meaning that I got to speak a lot of German, whilst learning about the culture first hand. I also got to learn a lot about Austrian food as my host "mum" was a fantastic cook and loved to cook Austrian specialities such as "Marillenknödel" (Apricot dumplings) for me to sample. Klagenfurt is a beautiful city in the South of Austria, rarely visited by British tourists. It is in Kärnten (Corinthia), otherwise known as the "Austrian Lake District". In the summer, the lakes were opened up as natural swimming pools, and in the winter, the council carefully checked ice thicknesses before opening them up as natural ice rinks, complete with benches and take away food kiosks on the ice! I have fantastic memories of this time!







Following my degree, I suspected that I would like to become a German teacher, but wanted to get some more teaching practice abroad first, so I applied to once again become an English Language Assistant, but this time in a grammar school in Bern, Switzerland. It was a very different, but equally amazing experience. I spent the weekdays teaching Swiss teenagers English, many of whom were already fluent in German, French and Italian. It was great to be living in such a multi lingual society. I then spent the evenings learning "Bärndeutsch" (the German dialect in Bern), as despite having a degree in German, the dialect was so different that I couldn't understand a word anybody was saying to me! This was a lot of fun and I now have a real interest in German dialects. My weekends were spent travelling all over Switzerland by train, exploring the beautiful mountains, towns and villages. I frequently return to Bern as I fell in love with the city and area and still have many friends there.





# **Miss Pavanel**

I went to Spain for my year abroad (I was studying Spanish and Tourism in Dublin, so for me my whole time at uni was a year abroad!). I spent Semester 1 in Castellon de la Plana, a relatively big place near Valencia. I lived in a flat with 3 other girls from around Europe. There I attended university, I played Volleyball with a local high-level team (Primera Division Femenina), so I got to travel a bit around Spain with them and speak lots Spanish. After Xmas, I moved to Lanzarote in the Canary Islands, where I did a 6 month internship in a five-star hotel. It was hard work, but I really enjoyed it. I was working at the front desk and all of my colleagues were Spanish. I was also sharing a flat with lots of other interns, mainly from South America, which was great as I made friends from all over the world and I was able to learn different accents and ways of saying things in Spanish. The Canary Islands are extremely beautiful - there are caves, volcanoes, beaches, interesting towns and delicious food to discover. Over there I fell in love with surfing (after almost drowning the first time I tried it!) and I haven't stopped surfing since!









## **Ms Euillet**

I spent the first 5 months of my third year of studies in Gießen in Germany, studying at the university there. Gießen is situated in Hessen and is quite central. The nearest city is Frankfurt which was easily accessible by the excellent and cheap train network. I was studying alongside lots of other international students which provided plenty of opportunity for excursions and partying, it was great fun and I made lots of friends. It was also the time when I learnt to be truly independent, I lived alone in a rented studio apartment, so I had to pay rent and budget for my food and essentials. My apartment was also quite a distance away from the university campus and so I cycled everywhere. In the spring I moved to Pau in the south-west of France. Pau is close to the Pyrenees mountains, in fact on clear days I could see the mountains from my bedroom window. University life in France was very different to Germany, French students tend to study close to their family home and spend the weekends back with their families. The university made sure that international students were welcomed and had a very good enrichment programme in place us, I took part in many organised activities such as snow-walking in the mountains. Pau is a very beautiful town and it comes alive in the summer months especially, my friends and I enjoyed endless strolls along the Boulevard des Pyrénées and picnics in the stunning Parc Beaumont. After I'd completed my degree course back in the UK, I was asked if I was interested in spending another "year abroad" to work as an English language assistant at a secondary school in Germany. Since I hadn't decided what I wanted to do as a career at that time, I seized the opportunity. I was offered a placement in Gaggenau which is in Baden Württemberg (famous for its Black Forest region). Gaggenau is a very small town and this carried the advantage of having very few fluent English inhabitants, so it was the perfect place to improve my spoken German. The school took good care of me and involved me in lots of extra-curricular activities such as accompanying history trips to Berlin and Prague.

## Mr Adango

I lived in Tottenham, in a shared accommodation with students from my uni. I had a job at Stansted, Costa Coffee, 3 days a week. I used to play football every Tuesday and Saturday with a local team. My nickname was Frenchy, because of my strong French accent. When I arrived in England; I was already pretty good in reading, writing and speaking English but when I got to England. I was shocked to not be able to understand what people were saying. It was simply too fast for me. I would take few seconds to process what I heard before answering. It was quite funny at times because of my reaction and the delay in answering. It took me about 3 months before I could level up.



### **Ms Netton**

I spent 18 months abroad. First I went to Lille in northern France, where I lived with a lovely French family and went to the local university, where I studied French as a foreign language. The family I lived with were really nice and took me on holiday with them and introduced me to lots of French customs, I am still in touch with them more than 20 years later! I also joined a French trampoline team and appeared on French television with my trampoline team. Joining a sports club was the best thing I could have done as I instantly had a group to which I belonged and with whom I could do lots of different activities.

After spending 4 months in France I moved to Germany. I lived near Düsselfdorf in a house share with a student and a pupil at the school where I taught. I was a foreign language assistant and I taught English to a range of different German pupils for 12 hours a week, for which I was obviously paid. Due to the fact the job was part time I studied for free at the local university, where I met lots of friends and was able to continue practising my French. I also travelled around lots of Germany at the weekends and visited many interesting sites and cities. In addition I travelled around the entire country with my German trampoline club and took part in the German National Team Championships, where we were the 5<sup>th</sup> team in Germany.

After my year in Germany I moved back to France, where I worked at Eurodisney. Although I didn't enjoy the work the opportunity to live in Paris was amazing and on all of my "jours off" I explored Paris, discovering much more than you see as a tourist. Living abroad was the best time of my life and therefore, as a working adult, I jumped at the chance to go back and study in Italy, which the EU kindly financed. I spent 4 weeks studying and travelling in Italy in order to improve my Italian and it reminded me of how much I enjoyed living abroad and discovering new food, new places, new cultures and new people.

If you get a chance to study abroad as part of your university degree I can wholeheartedly recommend it!

One of the best parts about learning a foreign language is communicating with others from that country in the language. Some of our KS3 pupils have had the opportunity to have a penfriend in France or Germany. This is what they've said:

"I've enjoyed having a penfriend because I can learn about school life in Germany", Asees (Year 8) "Having a penfriend has helped me so much in German because you write to them in the language you are learning and they write back to you in English. This is amazing as you can correct their mistakes and extend your vocabulary", Bella (Year 8)

"I enjoy finding out about the similarities and differences between German and the UK", Elizabeth (Year 9)

" I help mine with her homework, which I find really interesting", Summer (Year 9)

"I find it really fun and it makes me happy to have a friend in Germany", Taya (Year 9)

"It's great to find somebody with the same interests as me in Germany", Phoebe (Year 9) "It's very interesting and I love getting the letters in the post", Siri (Year 9)

"I enjoy talking to my penfriend on Snapchat and WhatsApp", Amare (Year 9)

"What I like about having a penfriend is it's someone you can talk to from a different country and someone you have never met in person" (Year 7 French pupil)

It can improve my French and it helps the French children improve their English. It is also nice to talk to other children my age in France" (Oliver Year 7)

"Having a penfriend letter is really exciting because I found out about their life and compare it to mine. I am also making a new friend from a different country" (Lily, Year 7)

"Having a penfriend means I can talk with someone thousands of miles away in their language and get to know them" (Darcey Year 7)

"What I like about penfriends is that I can talk to people from different countries so that it is more fun to learn languages and talk to different people in different countries" (Maisie Year 7)

"having a French penfriend is nice because you feel like you have someone in common to chat with and make friends with. I would recommend it" (James Year 7)

"I like having a penfriend because it means that I have someone to talk to and I can practise my French" (Charlie Year 7)

# Languages around the world

Although the languages we learn at Denefield are three of the biggest European languages (French, German and Spanish) there are many other interesting languages and diverse cultures across the world. Did you know that most African countries were colonised by three Europeans countries, France, England and Portugal? English, French and Portuguese are widely spoken in businesses and schools across Africa, however each African country has about 150 local languages that are spoken at home and on the streets. Those languages come from the different communities that form the country. Most communities understand each other's language because they live together, and the children go to the same schools. It allows those who do not speak any of the European language to communicate as it was before colonialisation.

Example of some African languages :

Yoruba, spoken in Nigerian and Benin	Bawo ni? How are you?
Twi, spoken in Ghana	Etin seyin? How are you?
