


Celebrating Denefield Friday 31 March 2023











As we enter the Easter holidays, I want to reflect upon the great successes that Denefield students have enjoyed over the past six weeks, as well as say goodbye to a teaching colleague who is taking up a promoted post at another school.

It has certainly been a busy and fulfilling term. The bulk of students' time, of course, has been spent learning new things in lessons, and in the case of Year 11 and Year 13, preparing for the qualifications that will open future doors to further education, apprenticeships and careers. This week, Mrs Davis and Mrs McHugh congratulated approximately 50 students in Year 11 who are doing particularly well – in some cases those who have gained particularly high grades in their PPE or mock examinations, and in other cases students who are exceeding their targets and who have made the greatest progress since they joined us in



Year 7. In addition, a great many students have been focused on sporting and extra-curricular activities. Particular congratulations must go to our Under 16 boys' football team, who last week beat Maiden Erlegh 5-1 and as a result came top of the U16s boys conference league. Our Greenpower electric racing car racing teams have been busily preparing for the new race season, building, testing and prepping the two cars they will race in April. Our Duke of Edinburgh students are focusing on their volunteering, skills and physical activities, ahead of the expeditions which take place in the summer term. Our mock trial team, consisting largely of lower school students supported by Harriet in Year 12, developed teamwork and articulacy skills before coming a very creditable third out of eight in the recent Reading-wide mock trial competition. And finally, there has been the exquisite school show 'Bugsy Malone', admirably described by Mr Shaw later in the newsletter. The end of the term is traditionally the time we say goodbye to colleagues moving on to pastures new. This term we have just one colleague leaving us, Mr Lean. Mr Lean has been an exceptional colleague during his time at Denefield. He holds his Science classes in rapt attention, has made a major contribution to sporting prowess and fixtures, has been a mainstay on school residential visits, and has been hugely important as deputy head of Sulham house. Mr Lean leaves us to take up a promoted post at another school. He will be replaced by Miss Rebecca Eckles, an experienced and first-rate Science teacher. Miss Eckles joins us in September, and so we have had to make some changes to the science timetable from Easter onwards – I apologise if this means your child has a different teacher as a result. Miss Upston, an experienced pastoral leader, takes up Mr Lean's position as deputy head of Sulham house.

Congratulations to all involved and if you didn't get involved or into the audience this time – there is always next year – where, all being well, we'll do this all again.



















The examples are selected from genres that we study on the course! Documentary: 102


